The readings for the 31st Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A are a call to humility and holiness. The first reading demands that we listen to God and love one another. The psalm reminds us to find our peace and rest in God. The second reading tells us that we work to proclaim the Good News. And in the gospel, Jesus calls out those who lay heavy laws on others but do not practice what they preach.

- **Practice vs. Preach**: Jesus criticizes the religious leaders for not practicing what they preach. This theme highlights the importance of congruency between one's words and actions in religious life.
- **Heavy Burdens**: The religious authorities are blamed for laying heavy burdens on others while not lifting a finger themselves. This theme centres on the unjust imposition of religious obligations without personal commitment.
- **Humility over Titles**: Jesus advises against using honorific titles like "Rabbi" and emphasizes the value of humility. This theme promotes a down-to-earth approach over seeking social or religious status.

Seeking recognition rather than service: The funeral of the Austrian emperors used to take place in the Cathedral of St. Steven in Vienna. But before the body of the deceased emperor was allowed to enter the cathedral for his funeral there was one ritual that had to take place. As the official in charge approached the gates of the cathedral, he would find them locked. Then the official was obliged to knock at the door to gain entrance. Upon hearing the knock on the door, a priest asks from inside the church, "Who is it that desires entrance here?" "His apostolic majesty, the emperor!" calls the official. "I don't know him." answers the priest. A second knock follows and a similar question is asked. This time the official announces: "The highest emperor". Again, "I don't know him" comes out through the locked door. Finally, a third knock is heard. "Who is it?" asks the priest. This time the official answers: "A poor sinner, your brother, requests admittance!" "Permission is granted: enter sinner. You are known to us." Then the door is opened, and the royal funeral takes place.



OUR PAPAL NUNCIO His Excellency Archbishop Novatus Rugambwa, the Pope's representative in Oceania has just suffered a serious stroke at his residence in Wellington. We ask that you pray for him in his recovery so that he will be able to return home soon to his family in Tanzania. Please also pray for Fr Giouse his secretary and now acting Nuncio. Archbishop Rugambwa was due to visit Dunedin on **Sunday 19 November** to preside at the **10.30am Mass, in St Joseph's Cathedral.**

Everyone is still welcome to attend as on this occasion there will be a reinstallation of the restored sanctuary angels and the Blessed Sacrament to the nave of the Cathedral.

New Bishop for Hamilton Diocese – Pope Francis has recently appointed Fr Richard Laurenson from the Diocese of Hamilton as the new Catholic Bishop of Hamilton. It means all six New Zealand dioceses now have a bishop, following the recent ordination and installation of Bishop John Adams as Bishop of Palmerston North. Currently the parish priest at All Saints by the Sea, Papamoa Coast, Bishop-elect Laurenson was born in Hamilton in 1968. He was ordained as a Hamilton diocesan priest in 1995 and has since served as parish priest in many parts of the diocese, including St Joseph, Waihi; Immaculate Conception, Taumarunui; St

Joseph, Fairfield and St Peter Chanel, Te Rapa; and Holy Cross, Hamilton North. Bishop-elect Laurenson attended Holy Cross Seminary in Mosgiel. He has a Baccalaureate in Theology from Otago University (1992) and studied for and obtained a Licentiate in Canon Law from Pontifical Urbaniana University in Rome from 2007 to 2010. He is also currently diocesan Chancellor, Vicar for Marriage, a member of the College of Consultors and, since 2019, Defender of the Bond at the Tribunal of the Catholic Church in New Zealand. As a military chaplain for a decade, he served for a time with peacekeeping forces in Bougainville and Timor Leste. Bishop-elect Laurenson is expected to be ordained on Friday 8 December, the Feast of the Immaculate

Conception, at a time still to be determined. Please pray for him and all our Bishops.

Vatican announces motto of Jubilee Year 2025: 'Pilgrims of Hope'



Following the extraordinary 2015 Holy Year of Mercy instigated by Pope Francis, the forthcoming Jubilee will take place in line with the norm of leaving a 25-year gap between each one. The most recent ordinary jubilee took place in the year 2000, as the world and the Catholic Church prepared to enter the new millennium. The Jubilee Year is a special year of grace, in which the Church

offers the faithful the possibility of obtaining a plenary indulgence. Traditionally, it begins just before Christmas and ends on the Epiphany of the following year.

The Pope inaugurates the Holy Year with the rite of the opening of the Holy Door in St. Peter's Basilica. After that, the Holy Doors of the other papal basilicas – St John Lateran, St Paul Outside the Walls, and St Mary Major – are opened and remain so until the end of the Jubilee Year.

A day to reflect on the non-violent legacy of Parihaka, Taranaki. Parihaka Day commemorates the 1881 invasion of the settlement of Parihaka and the non-violent resistance undertaken, by the people of Parihaka, under the leadership of Tohu Kākahi and Te Whiti o Rongomai, when faced with confiscation of their land. "Parihaka today continues ... to draw on the legacy of Tohu and Te Whiti to discuss and consider how to respond to injustice".
